A GROWING VILLAGE

Every time one of our ambulances pulls in to our hospital with rescued animals, we know that we will meet animals with all kinds of injuries and illnesses, from many different circumstances and situations: some found by a passer-by lying alone on a desolate road, others cradled in the arms of their care-givers after an accident, but all were rescued thanks to the incredible support of you, our donors. Their rescue journey begins the moment that someone calls on our helpline to report their injury or illness. This first action is one that has taken decades of work in awareness and day-in-day-out rescue to inculcate the desire to help street animals in the community. There are still instances where a destitute animal went un-noticed or ignored and was not spotted until the injury had become critical, and we hope for an increase in the community bringing animals directly to our shelter to increase the speed of treatment, but we are amazed at the yearly increase of calls to our helpline, which shows a genuine change of heart and understanding in the community. Now we receive calls for small wounds that would be impossible to spot unless the caregiver were paying close attention and giving cuddles, and calls for animals who have skipped a meal, showing great care from the caller which can be life-saving and prevent illnesses from getting worse.

Helping animals indeed takes a village, and it is heartwarming to see that over the years more and more animal lovers have become involved whether in their own neighborhoods, speaking out against cruelty and spreading awareness. Animal Aid remains the only hospital for street animals in the region, which means we will continue with ever more strength and endurance to continue rescuing animals, providing sanctuary, and building the community to create an ever-more protected place for our beloved street animals.

DEVELOPING OUR FUTURE HOSPITAL AND SHELTER

We are excited to have started the development of the land which we purchased for our permanent hospital and shelter site in February 2021.

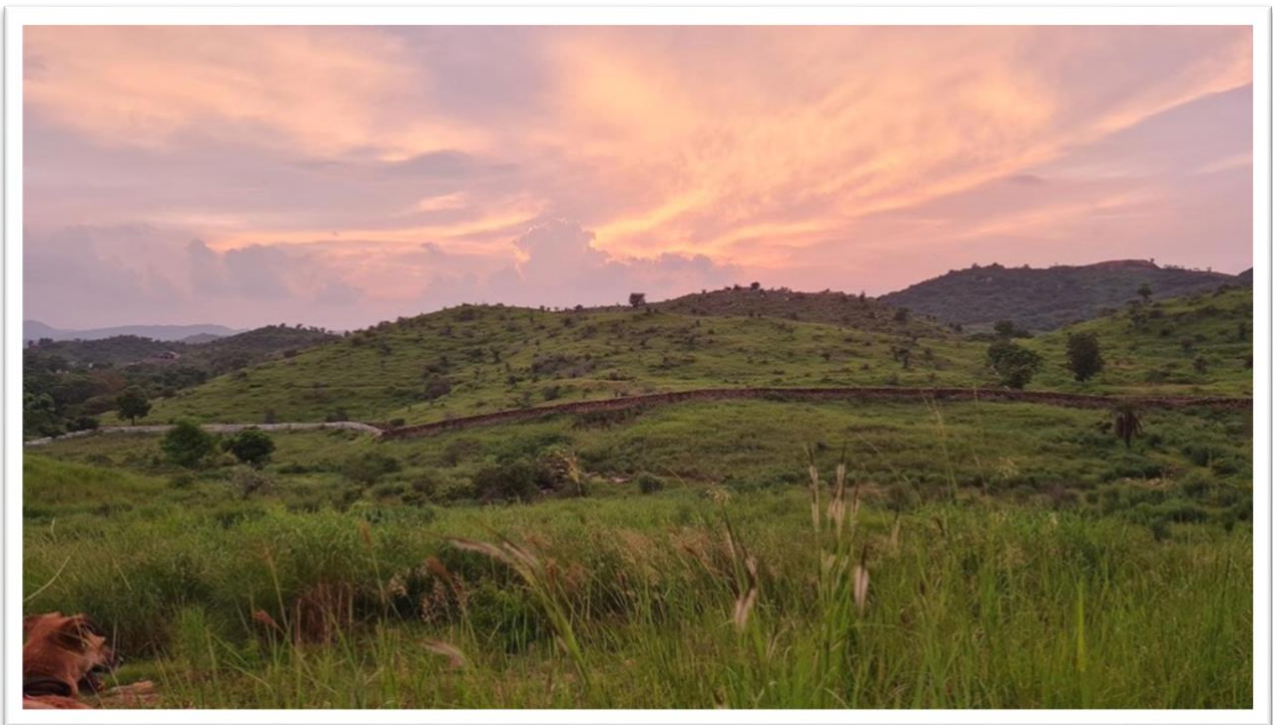
We applied on December 17, 2021, for 2 electricity connections of 30 KW each at both gates of the site taking into consideration the projected future electricity usage. We also started the Conversation application process in order to convert it to “Institutional Land” which will allow us to start building our shelter.

In the mean time we have been using the land to grow and cultivate wild grass to feed our large animals (cows, bulls and donkeys) and were able to get thousands of bundles

worth of valuable dry fodder which fed our cattle for 2 months. We continue to have 24-hour security guards present at the site to maintain the safety of the premises.

We have been studying shelter designs from around the world, engaging with various architects, and visiting other shelters in India in preparation for the construction of what will be our permanent hospital and shelter site for all the rescued animals of Udaipur.

Our current hospital and shelter are situated on leased land which we have with us for another 11 years, and we will be shifting all of our animals to this site once the construction is complete.



EXPANDING THE AMBULANCE FLEET

This year we grew our fleet of ambulances with the addition of 2 vans (Maruti Eeco) specifically for our Street Treatment Teams. This allows the teams to carry medicine, bandaging supplies, as well as 2 cages in case any animals need to be brought back to the shelter for treatment.

The goal of our Street Treatment is to reduce the number of animals admitted in our shelter, help prevent infections they can get from being in a hospital, and help them heal faster in the familiarity of their own neighbourhoods. These vans have already helped us care for hundreds of street animals this year.

We have also purchased two Ashok Leyland trucks and began to build custom-made hydraulic lifts in the back for the rescue and transportation of large animals. This will ensure safer rescue for both the animals and the rescuers!

BONITA

Ever heard the expression "cute as a button?" That's Bonita--a little black and tan button-sized sprite admitted with a big painful laceration on her back. Our street treatment team completed her wound treatments in her own neighborhood where she felt comfortable and happy surrounded by her friends and mother.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Animal Aid Unlimited is a USA-based, 501c3 tax-exempt charitable organization (est. 2002,) and is the main funding arm of Animal Aid's hospital and rescue center in Udaipur, Rajasthan, India. Donors from the USA and several other countries can claim tax benefits from their charitable donations to AAU. Funds donated to Animal Aid Unlimited are destined for our hospital and sanctuary in India and Animal Aid Unlimited transfers funds donated outside India to Animal Aid Charitable Trust on a regular basis.

Animal Aid Charitable Trust (est. 2007) provides medical services and sanctuary to animals in Udaipur, Rajasthan India. Indian donors can claim tax benefits from their charitable donations to AACT.

RESTRICTED FUNDS

Four grants totaling \$25,000 were made to four Indian animal welfare organizations (Blue Cross of India, Animal Care Trust, Humane Animal Society, RESQ). The grants were part of restricted funds donated by the Rolf and Elizabeth Rosenthal Family Foundation.

One grant for \$75,500 was made to FIAPPO as part of the Movement Building & Mobilisation project and sponsored by Animal Charity Evaluators.
